OEA Spring RA Highlights

On May 8 and 9 NWOEA delegates were among the 898 registered delegates at the OEA Spring Representative Assembly (RA) at The Greater Columbus Convention Center. The theme for this year's Spring RA was "One Mission, One Goal, One Team."

Delegates elected the following statewide candidates: Tim Myers (Elida EA), OEA Secretary-Treasurer; Jeff Rhodes (North Royalton EA), NEA Director #5; Robin Jeffries (Columbus EA), NEA Director #6; and Linna Jordan (Hilliard EA), OEA Board of Directors At-Large.

Prior to voting on Proposal #1 to amend the OEA Constitution and Bylaws, delegates heard from Jerry Oberhaus (Liberty Center), Chair of the OEA RA Evaluation Task Force. After many hours of discussion and research the task force was recommending Proposal #1, a set of amendments to the OEA Constitution and Bylaws that would provide language that would allow for, but not require, the elimination of the Fall RA. Receiving 64% of the votes but not enough to reach the 75% needed to amend the constitution, delegates defeated Proposal #1.

Delegates did pass the following three proposals that will amend the OEA Constitution and Bylaws: Proposal #2 allows the Ohio Student Education Association to have a voting seat on OEA's Board of Directors. Proposal #3 allows flexibility to prorate dues for members who join the union during organizing campaigns. Proposal #4 modifies the beginning and ending dates of the terms of office for the OEA President, OEA Vice-President, and OEA Secretary-Treasurer.

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Myers Re-Elected as OEA Secretary-Treasurer

Tim Myers (Elida) was elected for a second term as OEA Secretary-Treasurer by the delegates at the 2015 OEA Spring Representative Assembly.

Tim has outstanding credentials in the area of finance. He served on the OEA Board of Directors since 1998 with eight of those years on the OEA Program and Budget Committee. As a NEA Director, he served two terms on the NEA Program and Budget Committee. He has been a member of the STRS Board since 2008 and served as board chair from 2010-2011. He is currently Chair of the NEA's Pension Trustees Caucus.

During his thirty-plus years of teaching science and computer classes, Tim was active in his local association. He is a member of the Elida Education Association and served in various roles.

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Why Teach?: Excerpt from NWOEA RA Address

As I prepared this message, I began to reflect on the current state of education in our state and the frustrations of my colleagues about the countless hours of test preparation, test administration, the everchanging teacher evaluation system in our state and the incompetency of many of our administrators in our local districts. It is very easy to feel defeated, overwhelmed, unworthy and just down right exhausted, and we sometimes begin to doubt ourselves and question the reason we became a teacher, a bus driver, a custodian, a secretary or a school counselor. I encourage you to think back to the real reason you made the decision to become an educator.

Many days I ask myself, "Why did I chose this profession, what makes everything I do each day worth the effort, what do I hope to accomplish in my career?" A recent quote a friend posted on Facebook seems to sum up my answer to this question.

You laugh, you cry and you work harder than you ever thought you could. Some days you're trying to change the world and some days you are just trying to make it through the day. Your wallet is empty, your heart is full, and your mind is packed with memories of kids who have changed your life. Just another day in the classroom.

As educators we continue to train because we are life-long learners. We sacrifice time, sleep and family. We use our own money to provide for our students. We have learned from change, endured change, led others through change and have been told by others to embrace change. We educate all students regardless of race, religion, family situation, attitude or socioeconomic status. We have been criticized and accused of contributing to a "failing" system. We have lost countless hours of instruction preparing for tests and administering test while being evaluated on the results of two days' worth of test scores rather than our actual teaching ability.

Why? I ask you, why do we do this? Why? Because we are educators. We are dedicated professionals, we are the experts in our field, who are passionate about this noble calling. We live to inspire, challenge, and support our students and colleagues. We listen, learn and lead every day.

On a recent visit to The Ohio State University, my younger daughter Kirsten, a future Buckeye and Early Childhood Education Major, and I met with an academic advisor in the College of Education. The advisor explained to Kirsten that we get paid with love, and how true is that! I had a proud mom moment when the advisor asked my daughter why she wanted to be a teacher, and she said because my mom is a teacher. This young lady realizes that there is more to teaching than just liking kids. Wanting to make a difference, she still aspires to be a teacher and is passionate about those students who have been identified as gifted and are generally ignored because they can make it on their own.

Most of us became educators to make a difference and to influence and inspire young minds. Ask yourself, "What stands in the way of you fulfilling the reason you became an educator and which of these barriers do you have the ability to influence or change?" Collectively and individually we have the power to make a difference.

On the days you feel down and defeated and don't want to teach another day, always remember the real reason you became an educator. On these days I say to myself that I do what I do because my kids are worth it, my school is worth it, my colleagues are worth it, my profession is worth it, the future of public education is worth it and most of all, I AM WORTH IT! Never give up on your dreams and your ability to affect countless lives in ways that you could never imagine. We are part of the most important profession in the world. Let's make a difference in the future of public education together! Why? Because we are worth it!

OEA Spring RA Highlights

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The 2014-2015 Resolutions Report as amended was approved. Eleven New Business Items were brought before the delegates for discussion, and the following six were approved:

- The OEA President shall appoint a joint committee of higher education and K-12 members to study the College Credit Plus (CCP) Program and make recommendations to the OEA Board of Directors regarding the formation of a unified organizational strategy on CCP. The recommendations should include legislative, bargaining and local organizing approaches to implement the strategy. Recommendations of the committee shall be presented to the OEA Board of Directors and the Executive Director no later than the September 19, 2015 Board meeting.
- The OEA shall consult with NEA and other allied organizations to develop a strategy that would educate members about the impact of the tax on "cadillac" health care plans and to develop a plan to address said tax's impact on OEA members.
- The OEA shall consult with NEA to investigate potential civil rights implications of Ohio's graduation requirements tied to standardized testing results regarding their impact on English language learners.
- OEA staff to investigate the feasibility and report back to RA about a statewide program to strengthen the relationships between schools and targeted community and legislative leaders through conducting interactive school visits within every legislative district in the Ohio area.

- OEA will use communication tools (for example; an article in newsletter or an OEA website) to advise district representatives regarding radon testing.
- OEA will lobby the state legislature to require that ODE notify parents of their right to refuse and the implications of refusing statewide standardized tests that are not required for any grade promotion or graduation.

The 2015 OEA Teacher of the Year Lori Michalec (Talmadge EA) and the 2015 OEA ESP of the Year Della Jean Sampsel (Mansfield School Employees Association) were recognized and addressed the delegates.

Delegates contributed \$35,596.52 to the OEA Fund for Children and Public Education, OEA's political action campaign. ■



Board Focused on Long-Term Stability, Sustainable Benefit Plan

Last fall, the State Teachers Retirement Board received a report of the annual pension valuation results from our actuarial consultant. The report provided a "snapshot" of the actuarial position of the retirement fund, and it was good news. To measure the financial status of the fund. the board uses metrics that include the funded status (the ratio of assets compared to the system's liabilities) and the funding period (the amount of time the fund projects it will need to reach 100% funded status). The valuation report showed the system's funded ratio improved to 69.3% from 66.3%. In addition, the funding period for the pension fund decreased to 29.5 years from 40.2 years.

When pension reform laws passed in 2012, public employees throughout Ohio saw a number of changes to the benefit structure of their pension plans. These difficult, but necessary changes improved STRS Ohio's financial condition, and better than expected investment returns

since that time have continued to help the fund.

While not yet as strong as we'd like it to be, it's clear that STRS Ohio's financial condition continues to improve. My fellow members of the Retirement Board and I have been working on developing a funding policy to help ensure that the pension fund can meet its mission of partnering with our members in helping to build retirement security.

In an effort to put even greater focus on improving funding, the board recently agreed to adopt a 30-year closed funding period beginning July 1, 2015. Closing the funding period effectively targets a date when the system's unfunded accrued actuarial liability will be paid off and the pension fund will be fully funded. Can we get there in 30 years? It's difficult to say, but with every step toward that goal, the fund will get stronger. And a stronger fund means it will be better able to withstand the volatility that comes with investing in the stock market.

In the months ahead, the board is expected to discuss under what financial conditions it might consider modifications in plan design to maintain the long-term financial stability of the pension fund.

These studies and discussions are for planning purposes and are a responsible part of the board's fiduciary duties to help ensure a financially strong STRS Ohio that members will continue to rely upon for sustainable and secure benefits.

You can keep up to date on these discussions by signing up for STRS Ohio's email news service. Following the board meeting each month, STRS Ohio emails *Board News*, a concise summary of meeting highlights, to individuals who have registered for this service. Also, for your convenience, board minutes and STRS Ohio's administrative expenses are posted to the system's website each month.

Speaking of the system's website, I invite you to view a new video that is posted on STRS Ohio's home page (www.strsoh.org). It provides an overview of STRS Ohio and underscores the system's impact on the state of Ohio. The video is being shared with Ohio legislators and their staff members to highlight the positive effect that STRS Ohio has — paying billions in benefits to Ohioans each year. Delegates Set Policy

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(Danbury), At-Large Education Support Professionals Rep; Rhea Young (TAWLS), OEA Board of Directors Unit I Rep; and Chris Menier (Danbury), OEA Board of Directors Unit III Rep. There were no nominations for the position of NWOEA At-Large Minority Rep so that seat still remains vacant.

Delegates passed three proposals to amend the NWOEA Constitution and Bylaws. Proposal 1 replaces "Immediate Past President" with "Recording Secretary" so that in the event a vacancy occurs in both the offices of President and Vice-President, the Recording Secretary would be next in succession. Proposal 2 updates the language in regards to membership eligibility to reflect the diversity of NWOEA membership. Proposal 3 adds language to include new opportunities of electronic media for the Board of Directors to use to communicate with members.

The OEA Officers attended the RA and addressed the delegates. OEA President Becky Higgins referred to OEA as the "OEA Tree." The OEA Tree is growing by the addition of new locals joining OEA, by building relationships and by working with state leaders and community members. She emphasized that members need to be engaged and ready for the

battles that lie ahead for public education and ready to stand up to anyone that tries to harm any one of OEA's branches. OEA Vice President Scott DiMauro shared that there are several "hot" issues that OEA is currently addressing. Of these issues, OEA has designated standardized testing, charter schools, and funding as its main priorities. He updated delegates about current legislation regarding these three priorities. OEA Secretary-Treasurer Tim Myers gave a financial update. He reminded delegates that OEA is in the middle of a two-vear budget cycle so there will be no voting on the budget at the OEA Spring RA.

Also addressing the delegates were NEA Director #5 Jeff Rhodes and NEA Director #3 Brian McConnell. NWOEA President Jennifer Long acknowledged that public educators in these times could easily feel defeated, overwhelmed, unworthy and exhausted, but she encouraged delegates to be dedicated and to be passionate for the future of public education is worth it. Jennifer stressed the importance for members to be politically involved for our children and public education. She urged everyone to give to the Fund for Children and Public Education (FCPE) and \$653.00 was collected. Delegates adopted the 2015-2016 NWOEA budget. ■
